#### How it was created

By the 1860'2, a lot of elements had been discovered, but they had no organization.

Dmitri Mendeleev enjoyed playing with the element cards

He was able to predict new elements

## **Three Main divisions**

Metals: Shiny, malleable, conducting, usually solid

# <u>Non-Metals</u>: solid, liquid, or gas, usually brittle, poor conductors

#### <u>Metalloids(Semi-conductors)</u>: A mix of both

# Let's get a little more specific

<u>Alkali Metals</u>: group 1, Soft and shiny, reacts violently with water

<u>Alkaline-earth Metals</u>: group 2, hard, dense, strong, less reactive

<u>Transition Metals</u>: groups 3-12, much less reactive, harder, denser, higher melting points

# Let's get a little more specific

<u>Noble Gases</u>: Group 18, exist as single atoms, inert (doesn't react)

<u>Halogens</u>: most reactive non-metals, combine easily with alkali metals and form salts
